I have such strong feelings about the time I spend at camp. It is a haven, an escape, a utopia, a step back in time, a glimpse into the future ... a religion. In many ways I've come to think of camp as my religion. It's where I feel at peace, most spiritual and enveloped by my Judaism. Camp has been a refuge during some of my darkest moments. It's a place where everything is simple and predictable, where your only problems are camp problems and you can block out the real world if only for a few days or weeks. Camp has also become the venue of some of my greatest personal accomplishments where I am praised for my efforts and dedication. It's where I'm always greeted with the warmest hugs and the brightest smiles. Camp has taught me great life lessons over the years and it has also allowed me to become the teacher.

So many of us wear a talisman to express pride in our Judaism- a Chai or a star of David. I have my own- a small bar on a delicate chain with the coordinates that lead me to Interlaken.

I've come to feel quite differently about my two Jewish communities. In the real world, coming together with my synagogue community is a circle of life. From cooing infants to the elderly couple that must support each other to rise for the Torah service, it is both a wonder and a sobering reminder of where I am on this journey. Ever since losing my mom, it has been hard for me to embrace God in this setting. When I experience my Judaism at camp I'm surrounded by our future- the

loudest, most ruach filled disciples. So much of what goes on there and absolutely everything that happens during Shabbat at camp regularly brings me to tears. They are tears of joy and pride with maybe a little nostalgia thrown in. Just thinking about the sea of campers together lakeside at sunset, arm-inarm for Havdallah, gets me every time. You can't help but experience these feelings and be so secure in the knowledge that these young people will carry us into the future. It's amazing and humbling to be a part of that.

As I spend this last year as the Camp Committee Chair, I know this was a true labor of love. I love everything that camp stands for. I cherish everything camp has given me as well as our own children and all the children past, present and future who will be blessed to call camp their second home. I have come to love a few extra-special camp people as much as I love my own family. I love how our



community embraces camp and makes it a priority in our lives.

I will always be a Reform Jew that became a Conservative Jew that will remain forever a Camp Jew.

It's Erev Shabbat, and the Ozrim are gathered in the Ulam (Rec Hall) to partake in their first "Shabbat by Candle Light" – a late night song session for the Ozrim. Papa Hunter and I felt that singing together would be both a fun and meaningful way to kick off our first Shabbat as an Ozo group. We go through our thoughtfully chosen song list, singing every lyric on the page, and prepare to close the night. Hunter and I give a quick shpiel to sikum (wrap up) the last couple of days, and with a reminder of curfew, we say goodnight our kids. The Ozrim don't move an inch; instead, they continue to sing any and every song that pops into their heads. The acapella song session turns into a dance party, the dance party leads to a multitude of hilarious moments, and these hilarious moments turn into a treasured memory.

This, to me, is the essence of Camp Interlaken. I had the tremendous opportunity of being Mama Ozo this past summer for a very special group – a group I have been with since I was an Ozo myself and they were little Shoreshim. As their counselor, I woke up every morning with the goal of helping them achieve the happiness and sense of belonging I have always felt at camp. As their mama, I woke with the goal of giving them the confidence and tools to do the same for their children. The best part of every day was witnessing the outstanding moments of my kids achieving milestones, such as water skiing around the lake or performing in the talent show. First session, the Ozrim spent their time in various workshops and training sessions to transition them into a leadership role at camp. Second session, the Ozrim were placed into cabins to learn alongside our creative and inspiring staff. The experience for me was truly surreal. I witnessed an Ozo take another camper on a walk to talk through a sad moment. Together, they later told me our session on homesickness gave them some great tips on how to handle the situation.

I've had people ask me why I, at 25 years old, still choose to return to camp year after year. My answer is simple. I am my best version of myself when I am at Interlaken. If

I can be any part of a camper or counselor finding his or her inner best, then to me, there is no higher calling. I have worked harder and longer hours at camp than I have ever worked, but the joy that I experience is unequivocally the greatest joy I have felt in my life. The internal rewards are too precious to measure. I feel blessed to have had a rare job where I can see the difference I am making in such a potent way. It was a beautiful full-circle experience to spend my summer guiding the group that made such a powerful impact on my own camp story. As Ozrim, they constantly dazzled me. I believe that ruach (energy), patience, and a positive attitude are the ingredients of the ideal camp staff, and this group has an abundance of these qualities. They also have a passion for camp that reaches from the shores on infinitely to the stars. You may think I'm biased (I am their mother, after all), but I know that each one of those kids will make a great impact, both at Interlaken and



out in the world. Looking back to that first Shabbat with the Ozrim, I felt this amazing sense of comfort and happiness. After 16 sweet summers, I am saying lihitrahot (until next time) to Interlaken with the biggest of smiles. I know that camp is in the greatest of hands. Ozo XV – continuing the legacy. L'dor va Dor.
